The W. A. C. second team defeated the U. of I. second team yesterday in a one-sided game by the score of 48 to 6.

Four touchdowns were made in each half by Pullman, while Idaho made her lone touchdown toward the end of the second half by a fumble.

The features of the game were the playing of Grimes at quarter, Miner and Chidester, and the goal kicking of Spalding. Pullman made a touchdown in the first minute of play on a 70-yard run by Chidester. From that time on it was just a question as to the size of the score. Idaho could do nothing with the rushes of Pullman, who was held for downs but twice during the game.
